CHARLES CARROLL<sup>6</sup> DOUGLAS (*Charles*,<sup>5</sup> *Nathan*<sup>4</sup>, *Thomas*<sup>3</sup>, *Robert*<sup>2</sup>, *William*<sup>1</sup>), born at Sag Harbor, N. Y., May 8, 1826. At the age of 18, he began the study of miniature painting with Thomas Hazard Parker, a distinguished artist, with the intention of making it his business. After painting with Mr. Parker three years, and when about to begin the practice of his art, he found, much to his disappointment, that recent improvements in daguerreotyping had rendered that process so perfect as in a great measure to supercede the painting of miniatures on ivory. He determined to learn the new art, and, going to New York, entered the studio of J. Gurney, the well-known artist of that city. Here he remained until he became proficient in the business, and then established himself at Sag Harbor. In 1848 he made a tour of the Southern states, and on his return gave his attention to photography, which was a great improvement upon daguerreotyping. Taking a partner in his business, he remained at Sag Harbor till the year 1855, when, owing to delicate health, brought on by the use of chemicals employed in his business, he determined to abandon it for a more healthful occupation. He accordingly purchased a farm at Bridgehampton and re-

sided there till 1868, when he returned to Sag Harbor. In 1875 he removed to Glastonbury, Conn., where he purchased a farm in the central portion of the village, upon which he now ('78) resides. He married, May 23, 1853, Henrietta, daughter of John and Deborah Edwards, of Bridgehampton. Children, the oldest two born at Sag Harbor, the others at Bridgehampton:—

## 159.

ESTHER<sup>6</sup> DOUGLAS (*Caleb<sup>5</sup>, John<sup>4</sup>, Thomas<sup>3</sup>, Robert<sup>2</sup>, William<sup>1</sup>*), born in New London, Conn., July 25, 1778. In 1791 her father removed to New York state, and settled in Whitestown. She married, Aug. 17, 1797, Elisha Payne, of Whitestown. Mr. Payne was born in Lyme, Conn., Dec. 13, 1762. He was first married, Sept. 17, 1787, to Mary Brooks, of Lyme, who was born Jan. 12, 1766. By her he had four children: Abraham, John, Mary and Samuel, of whom all but the latter married and left descendants. Mrs. Mary Payne died in 1796. Mr. Payne died Feb. 4, 1843.

Esther Douglas was a woman of great energy. She possessed the faculty which New England women have, of making the best of circumstances, and which peculiarly fitted her for pioneer life. On one occasion, soon after her marriage, her husband made a journey to Philadelphia, with a drove of cattle, leaving her to manage affairs at home and protect the stock from the bears and wolves. Upon his return he gave her a "vacation" and she made a journey on horeback thirty miles, guided only by blazed trees, to visit her father, the Rev. Caleb Douglas, then settled at Whitestown. She died Sept. 12, 1853, aged 75 years. She was the mother of fourteen children, born in Hamilton:—
