The ceremony took place in the living room before an improvised altar of palms, ferns and Easter lilies. On either side stood tall cathedral candles. Lighted tapers throughout the rooms furnished illumination. Palms, smilax and lilies were used in the decorations. In the dining room, the centerpiece was a bowl of pink roses.

Miss Marguerite Haynie was maid of honor and her sister's only attendant. Donald Haynie, a brother of the bride, was Mr. Harry's best man. William W. Tracey of Chicago, an uncle of the bride, gave his niece in marriage.

Miss Haynie, as maid of honor, was gowned in tulle, shaded from pink to orchid color with a decollete bodice of cloth of silver. She carried Ward roses.

The bride wore a gown of white tulle with silver bands, veiled with an overdress of tulle. The skirt was short and made bouffant. The bodice was decollete and from the shoulders fell a court train of white satin. Her long tulle veil, worn in cap effect, was edged with rose point lace. She carried a shower bouquet of bride's roses and lilies of the valley.
