St. Patrick's Day Gives Lenten Season Recess, With Ball in Offing

Post-Easter Gayeties Will Include Grand Military Dancing Party at Kenwood Armory, Minneapolis, April 5, to Commemorate United States' Entrance Into the World War.

Arrah, go along wid ye now, sure and isn't it St. Patrick's Day, come Saturday!

And with the one day's recess from the somber season of Lent, the time comes to begin planning the post-Easter gayeties. One of the largest of these affairs will be the grand military ball of the Twin Cities to be given on the evening of Thursday, April 5, at the Kenwood armory in Minneapolis. The event will be given in commemoration of the entrance of the United States into the World war. The date of the declaration was April 6, but since the armory could not be obtained for the dance on that date, the committee in charge decided to give the ball the preceding day and dance into the anniversary date.

More than 2,000 invitations have been issued for the affair, the guests including the officers of the regular army, officers of the National guard, and officers of the Reserve corps who reside in the Twin Cities. The Arthur Landry "Commodore Band" will furnish the music for dancing and the Third infantry band from Fort Snelling will give a program of musical numbers. Officers of Fort Snelling also are arranging an exhibition to be given during the intermission. This will include the beautiful and elaborate ceremony of a formal "guard mount."

Many Patronize Concert Planned to Swell Fund For French Fellowships

April 13 Set as Date for Musical Event Arranged in Behalf of American Field Service Society and Similar to Affairs in All Large Cities of United States—St. Paul Society Lends Ready Support.

"You can do more for your country on the outside looking in right now than you ever could do on the inside looking out," remarks an American en route "home" to Paris in "Quixote Carries On," a book not yet out of the hands of the publisher, but probably destined to be next year's "best seller" as well as St. Paul's newest contribution to the world of letters.

The convictions of the fictitious character are closely allied with the ideals of the Society for American Field Service fellowships for French universities which originated in 1919 to promote a better appreciation in this country of French science and Mrs. B. and Mrs. Jules M. Hannaford, Jr., learning and to provide an enduring memorial to those members of the American field service who lost their lives in the world war.

Benefit Concert Planned.
To raise funds for this doubly worthy cause a concert will be given on the evening of April 13 in the Palm Room of The Saint Paul under auspices of the society and under the patronage of a long list of men and women prominent in the social and philanthropic world. The concert will be one of a series of similar affairs to be given in every large city of the United States, the artists on the program being Mme. Eva Gauthier, mezzo-soprano, and E. Robert Schmitz, French pianist and conductor. The name of Mrs. E. R. Sanford, Jr., heads the list of patronesses.

More than 2,000 college men served in the ranks of the field service from 1914 to 1919, and a large number received honors for their services from the French and American governments. The American field service, which was composed of American college men who drove ambulances and motor trucks attached to the French army during that period, created a number of fellowships in French universities from funds remaining in the volunteer organization at the end of the war.

127 Fellowships Sought.
The establishment of 127 fellowships in honor of that number of American field service men who were killed or who died during the war is being undertaken by the American Field Service Society of New York, with headquarters at 522 Fifth avenue. Thirteen permanent fellowships already have been established and the prime object of the present drive is to create forty more. The association hopes eventually to create the full total of 127 scholarships, each to be named after a fallen hero. The cost of a fellowship is approximately \$25,000, the income of which will maintain it.

The plan is to create a system of fellowships to France similar to the Rhodes scholarships to England, not only perpetuating the memories of the men who gave their lives, but also to bring about a better understanding between the French and American scholastic bodies and to give Americans an opportunity to benefit by the European system of education. Ninety-two men have received scholarships since the fund was established, and twenty-seven renewals have been granted. Twenty of these students who have completed their courses also have returned to American universities in the capacity of professors or assistant professors.

Jules Jusserand, French ambassador to the United States, is honorary president of the association, while Myron T. Herrick, American ambassador to France, is honorary chairman. Paul D. Cravath is the active president, while Representatives A. Platt Andrew and Charles A. Coffin and Dr. Alexander C. Humphreys are vice presidents.
