OCCUPANT HISTORY



1942-1960

Dr. D. H. Daniel

Resident: 1942–1960

Occupation: Physician

Dr. Donald H. Daniel was a Minneapolis physician and the longest continuous resident during this period, living at the home for more than two decades. His residency spanned World War II and the postwar era. In 1945, he was documented providing medical assistance to injured soldiers following a car accident directly in front of the home, highlighting his role as both a homeowner and practicing physician in the neighborhood..

1927-1929

Isadore H. Levin

Resident: 1927–1929

Occupation: Secretary-Treasurer
Company: Levin Bros. Inc.

Isadore H. Levin served as secretary-treasurer of Levin Bros. Inc. and became the homeowner in 1927, marking the transition of the property from the Gray family to the Levin family. This began a period of extended Levin family ownership.

1920-1921

Warren F. Shorling

Resident: 1920–1921

Occupation: Vice President
Company: E. E. Atkinson & Company

Warren Shorling worked as vice president of E. E. Atkinson & Company, a prominent Minneapolis firm. His residency at the home coincided with the beginning of the Roaring Twenties, a time of economic expansion and prosperity in the city.

1909-1917

Edward J. Scriver

Resident: 1909–1917

Occupation: Partner
Company: Moore & Scriver Company

Edward J. Scriver was the original owner and first resident of the home following its construction. He was a partner at Moore & Scriver, a Minneapolis business firm, reflecting his position within the city's professional class. City directories also show his son, E. Stanley Scriver, living at the home as a student, confirming the property served as the family's primary residence during its early years.

1930-1938

Harry T. Levin and Jane R. Levin

Resident: 1930–1938

Harry's occupation:
Clerk, Levin Brothers Company

Jane's occupation:
Stenographer

Harry Levin worked for Levin Brothers Company, while Jane Levin was employed as a stenographer. Their residency during the Great Depression reflects the home's continued occupancy during one of the most challenging economic periods in American history.

1923-1926

Ogden H. Gray

Primary Resident: 1923–1926

Occupation: President
Company: Gray Motor Company
Household Members:
Robert E. Gray occupation:
salesman, Gray Motor Company

Ogden H. Gray, president of Gray Motor Company, resided at the home during the mid-1920s. His son, Robert E. Gray, also lived at the residence and worked as a salesman for the same company. Their occupancy reflects the home's connection to one of Minneapolis's prominent automobile manufacturing families during this period.

1918-1919

George H. Rogers

Resident: 1918–1919

Occupation: Vice President
Company: Rogers Lumber Company

George H. Rogers served as vice president of Rogers Lumber Company, an important industry in Minneapolis during this period of rapid growth. His leadership role reflects the continued pattern of business executives residing in the Lake of the Isles neighborhood.
