Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Charles W. Scheider House is located at 1750 E. Ames Place, by the Ames School, in St. Paul's East Side neighborhood. The house features an asymmetrical and pictureque Shingle style design dominated by an all encompassing, complex roofline combining gambrels and hips, and a large, polygonal corner tower. The house sits on a random rubble, boulder base which extends to the 1st floor window sills. There is a boulder walled open terrace on the main facade which leads to a one story polygonal screened entrance porch which also has a stone base. The first floor of the house is clad in clapboard while the upper floor is sheathed in stained wood shingles. Parts of the second story project over the first floor. Decorative shingled edging encircles an oval attic window in the end of the gambrel roof on the main facade, borders the edges of the gambrel and tops a three sided second story window within the gambrel. At the base of the gambrel is a row of large dentils, a thin oval window and a group of three rectangular windows, each with a square transom. The polygonal tower adjacent to the gambrel roof has a slightly tapered profile, and a polygonal cap with a pointed ball finial while at the peak of the gambrel there is a ball finial which extends down to form a wood keystone over the oval window. Behind the entrance porch on the west side wall is a three story rectangular wing which juts out from the gambrel roof and which has a hipped roof with overhanging eaves. Though the house has a few casement windows, the majority of the windows are double hung rectangular windows with one over one and two over two sash. The house has undergone remarkably few alterations. The entrance porch has been screened in, yet it retains its original simple Tuscan columns and stone base.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

1890

The Charles W. Schneider House, built in 1890 at 1750 E. Ames Place*, is architecturally and historically significant as one of St. Paul's most sophisticated and intact examples of a style which never achieved tremendous popularity here--the Shingle Style-and as the most architecturally significant house remaining from the Hazel Park development (T887) of St. Paul's Greater East Side neighborhood ---- an area which was not The original owner of the house was Charles settled extensively until after World War II. W. Schneider, a bookkeeper for the Pioneer Press Company, publishers of the major St. Paul newspaper by the same name. The firm which constructed the house was Deeks and Witbeck. The recently completed Historic Sites Survey of St. Paul and Ramsey County identified only a handful of houses constructed by this firm. Of them, all were built in 1890, and each was designed by a fairly prominent local architect. Unfortunately, the architect of the Schneider House is unknown, though it seems likely that the house was designed by a local architect who was somewhat familiar with East Coast architectural trends since the Shingle Style was fairly unusual in St. Paul, and particularly on the East Side. It should be noted that the house is not one of the earliest examples of the Shingle Style in St. Paul--several such examples date from the early to mid-1880's, but it is, nevertheless, one of the city's finest versions of the style.
