Funeral Rites Held For Colonel Yancey At Rome Residence

ROME, Ga., Nov. 17.—(AP)—Funeral services for Colonel Hamilton Yancey, 83, for many years prominent in north Georgia and deputy insurance commissioner of Georgia, were held Tuesday afternoon at the residence, "Claremont." Colonel Yancey, a cultured gentleman of an aristocratic southern family, died at his home Sunday evening.

Dr. L. W. Collins, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Rome, and Dr. George L. King, presiding elder of the Rome District, officiated at the services. Interment was in Myrtle Hill Cemetery.

Born in North Augusta, S. C., Mr. Yancey received his primary education at Augusta, attended the University of Georgia and the University of Virginia. In 1871 he came to Rome and entered the practice of law. In 1886 he turned his attention to the insurance business with which he was prominently identified until his death.

Four daughters and a son survive. They are Mrs. Sam Hewlett, Atlanta; Mrs. D. B. Gillics, Cleveland, Ohio; Mrs. J. G. Newton, Rome, Mrs. Austin Clark, of Hewlett, N. Y., and Hamilton Yancey, Jr., Americus.
