

WINNIPEG GIRL WEDS LIEUTENANT

*Sybil Kneeland' Bride of
Charles J. Martin—
Couple Will Live in
Texas—Lillian Almira
Hudson Is Married—

WAR TIMES are responsible for unexpected nuptial events nowadays. One of these was the marriage of Miss Sybil Kneeland, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Kneeland of Winnipeg, and Lieutenant Charles J. Martin of the United States aviation corps, yesterday afternoon. Lieutenant Martin, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Martin of this city, came home Thursday on a brief leave and left immediately after the marriage with his bride for San Antonio, Texas.

The marriage took place at the home of Lieutenant Martin's brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Gerald R. Martin, 2368 Lake of the Isles boulevard, in the presence of the immediate relatives. Dr. James E. Freeman of St. Mark's Episcopal church officiated, at 5:45 o'clock. There were no bridal attendants.

Miss Kneeland, who was given in marriage by her father, wore a traveling suit of navy blue tailored cloth with a bodice of Georgette crepe, trimmed in a lighter shade of cadet blue. Her straw hat, simply trimmed with feathers, matched in color the trimming of cadet blue. Her flowers were a corsage bouquet of orchids and lilies of the valley.

Mr. and Mrs. Martin have a large pipe organ in their living room, where the ceremony took place, and Stanley R. Avery of St. Mark's church played a program before the ceremony. The Lohengrin wedding march was the processional and the military spirit was emphasized by the playing of "The Marseillaise" as the recessional. During the service, Mr. Avery played from Lohengrin and "Oh, Perfect Love."

White anemones and blush pink Ophelia roses with cybotium ferns made the setting for the bridal party in the living room. Greenery banked the organ and the vows were spoken before a floral altar. In the reception hall were Russell roses in tall bronze vases, and the Colonial pillars of the stairways were topped by maidenhair ferns. Pink Killarney roses and Shizanthus orchids in Venetian glass holders, and Venetian glass candlesticks with white tapers were used in the decorations in the dining room, where the buffet supper was served.

Lieutenant Martin was commissioned from the first officers training camp at Fort Snelling for aviation training in Texas. After taking training in ground work at Austin he entered the flying corps at Kelly Field, San Antonio.

Until he receives orders to sail for France Lieutenant and Mrs. Martin will be at the Menger hotel, San Antonio. Mr. and Mrs. Kneeland, the parents of Mrs. Martin, who are at the Leamington hotel, will return early this week to Winnipeg. Mr. and Mrs. R. T. Evans of Winnipeg were guests and are staying at the Radisson hotel.
