

Harry Levin Wins Fellowship for English Research



HARRY T. LEVIN OF MINNEAPOLIS is one of the six college graduates in the United States to receive the coveted appointment to the Society of Fellows of Harvard University. The young men, selected for the 'promise of notable contributions to knowledge and thought,' will have unusual opportunity for independent creative work.

Each will receive an annual stipend of \$1,250 and will be given free room-and board in one of the Harvard house plan units. They will have unlimited access to facilities of the university in devoting their time to productive scholarship, free from all academic regulations.

Levin, who is a graduate of West high school, was graduated from Harvard last June with a summa cum laude in English. In 1931 he wrote the Bowdoin prize essay.

His fellowship will last for three years of research in English.
